Salvation Army bell ringers sound the call of giving

CLIFTON, Va. — It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas this morning: Snow is falling, shoppers are bundled up as they hurry into the grocery store, and Bill Schmidt, 63, is ringing a hand bell non-stop near a bright red kettle as he collects donations for the Salvation Army.

He greets passersby enthusiastically even if they don't make a donation, and after people drop coins and bills into the kettle, he exclaims, "Thank you very much. Have a beautiful day. God bless you. Merry Christmas."

Schmidt, a lawyer in a suburb of Washington D.C., has volunteered here every Saturday during the holiday season for 17 years because, he says, he believes in the work done by the Salvation Army. That work includes feeding the hungry, giving Christmas gifts and food to those in need, providing disaster relief and running



rehab centers, food pantries and thrift stores. [Food pantries give away free food. Thrift stores provide used clothing at low prices or at no cost.]



"God calls all of us to various services, and this is what he called me to do," Schmidt says. "Jesus said, 'Whatever you do for the least of my brothers, you do for me,' and I believe no one in this country should go to bed hungry."

Across the nation, an estimated 25,000 bell ringers have been working throughout the holiday season, standing outside grocery stores and malls, says Maj. George Hood, a spokesman for the Salvation Army, a Christian-based charity.

The money is used to provide Christmas gifts and food for local needy families. [The Salvation Army does many kinds of charitable services]

The kettle program was started in 1891 by a young Salvation Army captain in San Francisco who needed money to feed the area's poor. So

he placed a big kettle for donations on the dock of Fisherman's Wharf, Hood says.

Since then, it has expanded across the United States and around the world. It also has gone beyond the kettles: The Salvation Army now accepts online donations at www.salvationarmyusa.org.

Last year, about \$130 million was raised nationally during the Red Kettle Christmas Fundraising Campaign, up from \$118 million in 2007, Hood says. "The American public has a fascinating way of digging deep when they know their neighbor is struggling. They give with their hearts, and we know they will come through again."

Children almost always want to give and get such joy from doing it, he says. "They like the bell, and they want to give money. Children are absolutely wonderful."

Schmidt remembers the time a girl was pulling on her mother's skirt as they left the grocery store, saying: "Mommy, mommy, I want to give the man money. I can change the world."

Sometimes people share stories about how the Salvation Army has touched their lives.

A woman once told Schmidt she donates every time she sees the kettle because one year when she was a child and her father was out of work, the Salvation Army provided Christmas gifts and food for her family, which included seven children.

Another time, Schmidt says, a man who donated money said he had been among the first responders at the Pentagon after it was hit by a hijacked jet on Sept. 11, 2001. The man recalled that the Salvation Army had been on the scene, feeding and taking care of emergency crews.



'A family affair'

His work now involves his entire family. He often gets help from his wife, four adult children, son-in law, daughter-in-law, four grandchildren and friends. "It has become a family affair," he says. "That's what's so heart-warming."

'What Christmas is about'

Schmidt is out here today in freezing temperatures

despite the fact that he's going through radiation treatment for prostate cancer. He says he feels fine, but his family wants him to rest more. He says he's not ready to turn in his bell yet.

"If God calls me home, then he's got a purpose for that," Schmidt says. "And if he doesn't, then he wants me to accomplish more things on Earth — not for me, but for him."

This work provides a chance to feel the true spirit of Christmas, which is "thinking about others and forgetting self," he says.

"The older I have gotten, the more I realize that this is truly what Christmas is about. It's giving to others. If you had all the love in the world, it wouldn't be worth anything unless you gave it away. If you accumulate all the money in the world, it doesn't do any good unless you give it away.

"When you give, the gifts multiply."

The lawyer thought this over for a moment and replied, "First, did your research also show that my mother is dying after a long illness, and has bills that are several times her annual income?"


Embarrassed, the charity representative mumbled, "Um...no."


"--or that my brother, a disabled veteran, is blind and confined to a wheelchair?"


